

Teacher Worksheet: Grades K-6

This activity corresponds to the *Gyre: The Plastic Ocean* exhibition on view Feb. 7 through Sept. 6, 2014, in the Anchorage Museum's third floor gallery. The purpose of the trip sheet is to focus student learning and provide a more rewarding visit. School groups are encouraged to visit related museum destinations, including our marine life tank in the Imaginarium Discovery Center and our Art of the North galleries, both on the first floor.

PRE-VISIT ACTIVITY

Prior to visiting the museum, collect trash around your school. Have students estimate and then calculate the weight or volume of the trash, guess how it arrived around the school, or discuss how that trash might end up in the ocean.

AT THE MUSEUM

Ask students to read the content in each section of the exhibition, answering the questions on the trip sheet as they explore. Feel free to modify trip sheets to align with students' needs or classroom curriculum.

POST-VISIT ACTIVITY

Using the Gyre exhibition as inspiration, have students create a piece of art with the trash they collected around the school. As a class, discuss ways students can help reduce ocean trash.
